The P&C Inclusion and Diversity Sub-committee was started in 2021 with the following aims:

 \cdot Raise awareness of inclusive education practices and principles and the benefits it provides to the whole school population.

 \cdot Work with the school to enhance the school's capacity to educate children with disabilities or other barriers to inclusion.

• Provide a support network to parents/carers of children with disabilities or other barriers to inclusion.

What's happening at Alexandria Park Community School?

In 2021, APCS celebrated Neurodiversity Celebration Week for the first time and the P&C made a \$1500 donation to the school library to bolster the collection of books that specifically reflect neurodivergence and various disabilities. We look forward to an annual celebration of Neurodiversity Celebration Week

The sub-committee is focused on helping children with potential barriers to inclusion in education, but everyone in the broader school community has a role to play in ensuring APCS is inclusive. As such, everybody is welcome and encouraged to participate.
