Dear Parishioners.

This week I continue my reflections on the three dynamics that are so significant during the Lenten Season – almsgiving, prayer, and fasting. Today I turn to prayer – with a focus on personal prayer (as distinct from Liturgical prayer and worship).

I read recently "A prime characteristic of a meaningful conversation is it carries within it an intention to leave behind something of value. Simultaneously it seeks out the hidden gems of insight within people's stories. The conversation needn't be conceptually complex or intellectually draining. The subject matter is less important than why and how you speak." (This quotation is from the World Economic Forum website- author unknown)

Now while this quotation concerns interpersonal communications it has some wise insights that may help us to appreciate prayer too. While a classic definition of prayer is that of 'turning one's mind and heart to God' – we are essentially talking about prayer as communication with God.

It may help our awareness and practice if we see prayer - in its utter simplicity - as those times and moments where I enter into a dialogue with God. If we follow the insights above, then we might see prayer as a time of 'conversation' with God – and a time not necessarily determined or governed by formulas, formats, settings, or rituals.

In its fundamental shape prayer is:

- (i) a time wherein we can share something with God (to leave with God something of value). Thus, in my prayer, it is good to 'leave' or hand over to God, those worries I may have, those pleas for the assistance I need, or indeed those joys I feel or the thanks that I wish to express.
- (ii) a time to listen carefully to what God is offering to me (i.e. seeking the 'hidden gems' that God constantly offers). Here such offerings from God may take the form of inspiration, insight, or a movement towards a good attitude or action whatever, God's gifts and grace offered to me will always be just that, an offering, and one that respects my freedom.
- (iii) a time to express what is with me just now (the subject matter need not be complex or shaped according to any one theology or school of prayer and spirituality). Prayer is essentially me sharing the moment with God and it only has to take the form of my thoughts and hopes and be expressed in my own words.
- (iv) a time just to be with God (the matter does not have to be according to any one formula or shape). The most important thing is to just speak to God prayer is communication as we know can take numerous forms (both verbal and non-verbal).

Of course, we often join with the community to pray in common, and at times we take up written and familiar prayers and use them as our own, but in the quiet moments and in those times we feel deeply drawn to God – then we only need to share what is in our hearts and to listen for a response as a friend to friend.

ST VINCENT DE PAUL CONFERENCE GLEN OSMOND / PARKSIDE REPORT OF ACTIVITIES 2021

AREA OF RESPONSIBILITY

The Conference received requests for assistance from Companions living in the area bounded by Unley Rd, Cross Rd, Portrush Rd and Greenhill Rd. A small number of requests were received from Companions just east of Portrush Rd. The area contains a number of Housing SA complexes at Eastwood, Fullarton and Parkside. Plus Companions are located at the Tollgate Motel, Welcome Inn and Jacksons Motor Inn.

COMPANIONS

Our Companions were mainly all Centrelink clients and receiving either Newstart allowances or disability pensions. A small number had partners and there were 14 families with children.

Several Companions were in private rental premises and had difficulty in paying the higher rental rates.

A significant number of Companions had mental issues while others were unemployed.

A small number of women subject to domestic violence were referred to the Conference.

The most common reasons for seeking assistance were related to electricity, gas and telephone accounts.

Members attended in pairs and either met the companions outside of their premises or at St Raphael's Church. Covid and occasionally personal safety reasons restricted members from entering accommodation.

Assistance was provided by issuing the Companions with gift cards from Woolworths for food, and Vinnies shops for clothing. Metro transport tickets were also provided to assist with transport. The Conference agreed to investigate using Foodbank services.

EMERGENCY FLOOD APPEALS


Archbishop Patrick O'Regan suggests two appeals for donations to help those affected by the floods in New South Wales and Queensland.
